Funded Palliative Care



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Purpose	The purpose of the Palliative Care programme is to provide a funding stream that enables patients diagnosed with a life limiting condition (malignant and non-malignant) and expected to live less than 12 months to receive care and support from their general practice team at no cost or at a subsidised cost.				
Introduction	People are entitled to be able to choose their place of care and location of death. An increase in the ageing population and improvements in cancer treatment, means that more people are living with a terminal illness. There are also increasing numbers of people with non-malignant disease requiring end of life care who do not have the same level of access to palliative care services. Additionally, increasing pressure on hospital level care means there is a flow-on pressure for general practice teams, therefore, funded support to care and manage people at the end of their life removes the need for patients to receive Primary Care palliative services. Equity	Palliative Care funding is available to all ethnicities and quintiles; however, Māori and Pacific peoples are known to have lower rates of end-of-life care provided by general practices and palliative care providers/hospice. Eligibility/ Business Rules	 Patient is enrolled and; Has a diagnosis of malignancy or non-malignant condition Is deemed by their GP to be expected to die within the next 12 months (ask the surprise question, "Would I be surprised if this patient dies within 12 months)? One of the packages of care can be claimed each day The patient will exit from the programme on their death or at a time identified by them or their family/whānau. Patients not eligible for Palliative Care funding Patients living in a residential care facility or private hospital where there are alternative funding arrangements for palliative care. Patient Co-payments 				

It is expected that patients enrolled into the Palliative Care Programme do not pay for the initial consult and home visits. Co-payments for follow up visits is at the

discretion of the Practice.
